Mr. Joe Furman, Director of Economic Development with the Boone Area Chamber of Commerce, presented a proposed resolution requesting the United States Congress and the North Carolina General Assembly continue to provide financial and administrative support for small businesses in Watauga County and all Western NC counties impacted by Hurricane Helene. Mr. Furman read the resolution.

Vice-Chairman Castle, seconded by Commissioner Greene, moved to adopt the resolution as presented by Mr. Furman.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT MATTERS

B. Proposed Local Bill for Housing to be Entitled An Act To Authorize The Town of Blowing Rock, The Town of Boone, and The Watauga County Board of Education To Construct and Provide Affordable Housing for Town Employees and for Public School Teachers

Mr. Joe Furman, Director of Economic Development with the Boone Area Chamber of Commerce, stated that discussions were held over the past year with the North Carolina State Employees Credit Union Foundation for public employees housing assistance. Approximately one year ago, the UNC School of Government made staff aware that a Local Bill would be needed for such a project.

Mr. Furman presented a draft of a Local Bill for the Towns of Boone and Blowing Rock along with the Watauga Education Foundation, for such a project for teachers and other public employees. The deadline to introduce the Local Bill was rapidly approaching. Through the project, housing would not be subsidized but would rather be assisted in the form of a 0% loan. The County's involvement could be the sale or lease of County-owned land across from the Brookshire Road soccer fields which has long been considered for affordable housing. The Education Foundation would be the applicant. The Local Bill would not commit the County to anything but would allow the project to happen. If not introduced at this time, it would be one year before a Local Bill could be introduced.

The Local Bill would allow for the County, if the County so chose, to lease or sell the land without following Statutory laws. Mr. Furman requested to have Watauga County's name included in the Local Bill.

After discussion, Commissioner Marsh, seconded by Commissioner Hodges, moved to add Watauga County's name to the Local Bill authorizing the County, Town of Blowing Rock, Town of Boone, and the Watauga County Board of Education to construct and provide affordable housing for public employees and public school teachers.

HURRICANE HELENE UPDATE

Mr. Will Holt, Emergency Services Director, provided an update on the recovery from Hurricane Helene. Mr. Holt stated that PPDR and Waterway removal was underway with Rights-of-Entry ongoing. The information to register is on the County's website. Site are set up at the Western Watauga Community Center and the Poplar Grove Connector Site where in person help can be obtained. Flyers will soon be placed at all of the County's Container Sites and other public buildings. County Manager Geouque stated that billboards and temporary electronic roadside signs may also be used.

Mr. Holt state that waterway removal was underway on Hwy 421 and several other areas earlier in the day. Soil and Water and NCRS would be going to the removal locations when removal was done to see what remained. Mr. Holt stated that the registration deadline for individual assistance was March 8, 2025. If it were extended again, Mr. Holt stated that it would be requested for the in person sites to remain open as well.

The report was for information only; therefore, no action was required at this time.

MISCELLANEOUS ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

C. Kill/Chill Project

The County Manager stated that the County Attorney had an update on the Kill/Chill project.

County Attorney Miller stated that the Fair Market Value (FMV) for the lease was determined to be between \$9 to \$11 dollars by Appraiser Mike Sweeting. Piedmont Meats wanted to obtain their own FMV. Mr. Miller stated that a \$500,000 grant for the project had been decommitted and that due to Hurricane Helene, the space designated for the facility at the old landfill site was being utilized by the Sanitation Department. When asked the costs of not being able to utilize the site, County Manager Geouque stated that it would costs approximately \$75,000 per year to haul the materials currently being stored on the site. Over time that would add up to approximately \$1.7 million which would be considered money lost due to not being able to use that site. No action was taken at this time.

Mr. Gray retired from Appalachian State University years ago having served as the Director of Conference and Institutes. He was also a Christmas tree grower for many years. The TDA has requested the reappointment of both Ms. Rogers and Mr. Gray each for a three-year term.

Dear Speaker of the House Hall, Senator Hise, and Representative Pickett:

Hurricane Helene amplified the need for communities to be prepared for natural disasters. One specific issue highlighted was the need for pre-position assets with close proximity to the affected area. This was self-evident in Watauga County's case where there was difficulty getting resources to our area due to roads being washout, flooded, or blocked by debris. The County continues to assess what worked and areas in need of improvement.

As part of the County's assessment, an increase in the risk of wildfires has been recognized due to the unprecedented number of trees down as a result of Hurricane Helene. These downed tees combined with the lack of rainfall has created a significant amount of fuel to lead to catastrophic wildfires. A catastrophic wildfire would place our community directly in the sights of another major disaster, while still recovering from Hurricane Helene. A wildfire in the magnitude that struck Gatlinburg, Tennessee would devastate our community and recovery efforts.

Our local Fire Commission and Fire Fighter Association has identified one step that could assist in the mitigation of risk along with other steps in reducing the amount of fuel for wildfires. The single most important step would be to fully fund the North Carolina Forest Service's budget for Fiscal Year 2025-2026. Without full funding, the Forest Service's ability to address the escalating wildfire threat will be severely compromised. Two key takeaways from the devastating Gatlinburg Wildfire was 1.) Forest Management Practices: The assessment pointed out the importance of improved forest management to reduce wildfire risks; and 2.) Resource Allocation: Insufficient resources for firefighting and prevention efforts were noted as a critical issue.

We respectfully request the full funding of the North Carolina Forest Service to assist in the mitigation of wildfire risks to our community and to ensure we do not repeat issues already identified by the Gatlinburg Wildfire that could have been prevented with appropriate funding.

Thank you for your support and consideration of this most important matter regarding public safety.

Senator Hise and Representative Pickett:

We write you with an urgent request: to fully fund the funding requests of the North Carolina Forest Service as attached. The unprecedented wildfire risks facing Watauga County and the broader Western North Carolina region, particularly in the wake of Hurricane Helene, demand immediate and robust support to protect our communities, natural resources, and the brave men and women who serve on the front lines of fire prevention and suppression.

Hurricane Helene, which struck our region in September 2024, left behind a landscape primed for disaster. The storm's ferocious winds and torrential rains felled countless trees, scattering debris across forests and residential areas alike. This downed timber, combined with drying conditions and seasonal leaf fall, has created an extraordinary fuel load that significantly elevates the risk of catastrophic wildfires. In Watauga County alone, our steep slopes, dense woodlands, and growing number of homes nestled within the wildland-urban interface amplify this danger. The potential for rapid fire spread threatens not only property but also the lives of residents and the firefighters tasked with protecting them.

Western North Carolina has already borne witness to this heightened risk. Recent wildfires, such as the Elk Creek Fire in Watauga County in November 2023, which burned over 200 acres in a matter of hours, and others across the region, underscore the volatile conditions we face. These incidents, occurring even before the full impact of Helene's debris was realized, serve as a stark warning of what lies ahead without adequate resources. The NC Forest Service, alongside local fire departments, has been stretched thin responding to these events, and the compounding effects of Helene have only intensified the strain.

The NC Forest Service plays an indispensable role in mitigating these risks through wildfire prevention, suppression, and community education programs like Firewise. Their expertise and resources are critical to supporting our 15 local fire departments in Watauga County, which rely on state assistance for training, equipment, and coordination during large-scale incidents. However, without full funding for the 2025-26 budget, the Forest Service's ability to address the escalating wildfire threat—exacerbated by Helene's aftermath—will be severely compromised. This is not a hypothetical concern; it is a present and growing reality.

We respectfully urge you to consider the economic and human costs of inaction. Wildfires in Western North Carolina could devastate tourism, a cornerstone of our regional economy, destroy homes and businesses still rebuilding from Helene, and place an unbearable burden on our volunteer and career firefighters. The cost of suppressing a single uncontrolled wildfire far exceeds the investment required to bolster the NC Forest

rebuilding from Helene and place an unbearable burden on our volunteer and career firefighters. The cost of suppressing a single uncontrolled wildfire far exceeds the investment required to bolster the NC Forest

Service's proactive measures. Full funding will ensure they can hire and train personnel, maintain equipment, conduct prescribed burns to reduce fuel loads, and expand outreach to help residents prepare their properties against fire risks.

As we find ourselves in another fire season, time is of the essence. The people of Watauga County and Western North Carolina cannot afford a repeat of past underfunding that leaves us vulnerable to preventable disasters. We implore you to act decisively by fully funding the NC Forest Service's 2025-26 budget requests, providing the resources necessary to safeguard our communities from the extreme wildfire risks we now face.

Thank you for your attention to this critical matter and for your continued support of public safety across our state. We stand ready to provide further information or testimony to assist in your deliberations.

POST HURRICANE HELENE NCFS NEEDS TIMBER DAMAGE SUMMARY – FRAMING THE ISSUES



NC Forest Service Needs:

To address the issues identified after Hurricane Helene, NCFS is requesting the following from the North Carolina Legislature.

Non-Recurring Needs:

- 1) (\$10,000,000) Funding to replace and upgrade firefighting equipment.
 - a. The average age of the next 20 Firefighting Bulldozers, that need replacement, is 33-years.
 - b. Many of our transport units and specialized wildland firefighting equipment are Federal Excess Property. Many date from the 1970's or earlier.
 - c. Specialized equipment is needed to recover from Helene and prepare for the wildfires to come. These include equipment such as masticators, skid steers with mulching heads, and tracked wildland fire engines.
- 2) (\$5,000,000) Funding to contract with private, other state, and federal equipment, aviation, fire crews, and other firefighting resources for the spring and fall 2025 fire seasons.
 - a. These resources will likely be needed to contain and control any wildfire that becomes established in Helene damaged areas.
 - b. These resources are trained and qualified and are available to assist at a moment's notice. New FTEs, brought on after July 1, 2025, from recurring funds, will not likely be hired and trained in time to offer support for fires that occur in 2025
- 3) (\$622,000) NCFS Linville River Nursery funding to recover from TS Helene's direct impacts.
 - a. Replace seed, tools, equipment and supplies lost during Helene flooding
 - b. This nursery provides many of the seedlings to the Christmas tree industry as well as for reforestation projects in Western NC.
- 4) (\$4,500,000) NCFS Aviation Firefighting Helicopter Replacement
 - a. The NC Forest Service Division of the Department of Agriculture currently operates two Type 3
 firefighting helicopters
 - b. One of the Type 3 helicopters (H-8) has been in service for more than 23 years and the annual costs to maintain airworthiness have been steadily increasing to the point of no longer being cost effective.

Recurring Needs:

- 1) Salary Adjustment funding to address NCFS recruitment and retention.
 - a. NCFS has averaged nearly 100 vacancies over the last 5 years.
 - b. Most employees that leave cite low pay and poor work life ratio, due to emergency response requirements, as primary factors when choosing to leave.
 - c. Recruiting and retaining highly qualified firefighters and incident management team members is essential to fighting fires in a safe and cost-effective manner while protecting values at risk and keeping fires as small as possible
- 2) (\$900,000) Increase NCFS Aviation operating funding.
 - a. Increases in the cost of maintaining our fleet of 22 aircraft have resulted in an annual shortfall.
 - b. Examples include insurance, fuel, fire suppressants, and contracted services

- 3) (\$1,500,000) Appropriated NCFS Overtime and On-Call compensation.
 - a. On average (FY19-FY23) the cost to NCFS, for on-call and emergency callback is \$432,608 (appropriated) and \$225,045 (Receipts).
 - b. During the state fiscal year 2022-2023, NCFS permanent employees worked 157,586 hours and earned 92,477 hours of compensatory time related to wildfire suppression in the state.
 - c. With an average hourly pay rate of \$23 for our firefighters, and if funds were available to pay out the fire compensatory time, the cost would be \$2,126,971. Currently On-Call is funded out of our lapse salaries generated by vacant positions
- 4) (\$3,500,000) Funding to replace and upgrade our fleet of firefighting equipment.
 - a. Current estimates for equipment that meets replacement criteria is \$29,000,000 (2024 dollars).
 - b. Increased annual funding is needed, in addition to the non-recurring request, to replace aging equipment such as bull dozers, truck tractors, trailers, and fire engines.
- 5) Recurring (\$1,906,000) and (\$767,000) non-recurring Funding and 22 FTEs to create a Wildfire / Fuels Management Crew.
 - a. In the mountains of Western NC, manpower also known as hand crews are critical in responding to and controlling wildfires, to assist on prescribed burns, and implement fuel reduction treatments to protect the public.
 - b. NCFS is requesting new positions and an operating budget to develop a Fire and Fuels Hand crew program to assist in all aspects of wildfire and fuel reduction treatments to protect critical infrastructure, homes, and the public in the TS Helene impacted areas.
- 6) Recurring (\$346,000) and non-recurring (\$300,000) Funding and 4 FTEs to Forest Fire Equipment Operators in Western North Carolina.
 - a. FFEO's are critical in responding to and controlling wildfires, to assist on prescribed burns, and to implement fuel reduction treatments to protect the public through operation of heavy equipment.
 - b. NCFS is requesting new positions and operating budget to add to our equipment operating capabilities and needs to assist in all aspects of wildfire and fuel reduction treatments to protect critical infrastructure, homes, and the public in the TS Helene impacted areas.
- 7) (\$370,000) Recurring Funding and FTE for the NCFS Wildfire Weather and Fuels Intelligence Program.
 - a. Accurate and timely monitoring and modeling can help firefighters predict how intense fires will burn and how difficult they will be to contain and control.
 - b. Appropriated funding would allow the program to stabilize and react to the dynamic wildfire environment in our mountain communities, as well as statewide.
 - c. Current grant funding is not able to fully support the program, let alone fund needs due to the impact of Hurricane Helene.
- 8) (\$922,000 recurring and \$702,000 non-recurring) 11 FTEs to better address the expanded needs of Forest Landowners and the public in Western NC.
 - a. 7 counties in Western NC are currently only staffed with one county forest ranger. Adding assistant county forest rangers will allow NCFS to respond to increased emergency response and forest management needs in these counties.
 - b. Law Enforcement, Safety Officer and BRIDGE Project Leader positions will be able to support the NCFS needs across Western NC and Statewide.

9) (\$1,500,000) Increased funding for the Forest Development Program (FDP).

- a. FDP is an NCFS administered cost share program that funds a range of forest management practices including tree planting, prescribed burning and other site preparation. This program is underfunded by \$1.2 to \$2 million annually, based on the number of applications that cannot be funded.
- b. Unfunded forestry cost-share program applications face a significant risk of going unplanted, jeopardizing the State from realizing the numerous societal, economic, and environmental benefits associated with promptly replanted and improved woodlands. Additional funding is also necessary to supplement potential lost FDP forest assessment monies from recent forestry mill closures and revenue from timber loss due to Tropical System Helene.

Helene Timber Damage Summary:

Hurricane Helene made landfall in Florida on September 26, 2024. Impacts in North Carolina started in the early morning hours of September 27. However, moisture from the storm was inundating Western North Carolina for days ahead of the winds arriving. The resulting rainfall (in excess of 30-inches in Yancy County) softened the ground and created conditions for timber to blow down. The wind arrived early in the morning of September 27. Peak wind gusts at Grandfather Mountain were 106 mph. In early October NCFS conducted an aerial survey of timber damage. This survey produced a conservative estimate of 822,000 acres damaged. Satellite imagery that shows changes in forest cover suggests the extent of damage is much greater.

Framing the Issues:

Access for Emergency response – State and locally maintained road systems are opening. However, numerous private roads, logging roads and fire breaks have been completely blocked by downed timber or washed out by flooding. Fire managers in Western North Carolina rely on these to access and contain wildfires. Natural barriers, such as streams, that historically would stop, or slow fire spread cannot be relied upon due to the amount of debris. With these access points & barriers blocked or unusable, firefighters will have to find open routes that are further away from the fire, resulting in larger fires.

Severity of Wildfires / Wildland Urban Interface – The historic amount of blown down and damaged timber has and will impact how wildfires are contained and controlled for decades to come. Combined with damage in and around the Wildland Urban Interface the potential for damaging wildfire is increased. Limited access and unreliable natural barriers will result in larger fires (As we have seen already from the Crooked Creek and North Fork Fires in McDowell County - January 2025). In the short term, leaves and pine tops will ignite easily and burn intensely resulting in extreme fire behavior and rapid wildfire growth. In the long-term, larger timber will start to dry and contribute to fire intensity, smoldering and smoke production resulting in wildfires that take longer to control and produce more smoke. Combining fast moving fires that are harder to access and control with the urban interface can have catastrophic impacts as evidenced by the Gatlinburg Fires in 2016. NCFS has a critical need for manpower and equipment to open these accesses and battle the wildfires that are sure to come.

Insects, Diseases, & Non-Native Pests – Both native and non-native insects and diseases are likely to flourish in the wake of Hurricane Helene. Destructive species such as Pine Beetles, Spongy Moth, Spotted Lantern Fly and Emerald Ash Borer will seek stressed / damaged timber to attack. Often killing these weakened trees. Invasive plants such as Miscanthus will take advantage of openings in the forest, created by the hurricane, to expand and choke out native species. NCFS positions are needed to identify these areas and help provide resources to landowners to control outbreaks.

Forest Management / Timber Value Loss – FIA data suggests that the 822,000 acres of timber damaged is valued in excess of \$214,000,000. Much of this timber is not feasible to salvage for forest products. Preliminary estimates show that some counties, such as Avery, Mitchell and Watauga, have 30% or more of their forestland damaged. North Carolina forest landowners need support and professional guidance to determine what options are available to them. The NCFS Forest Development Program is well established and positioned to provide cost share assistance for these forest landowners. Unfortunately, many of these same counties only have one NCFS position staffing them or they are vacant due to poor recruitment and retention. NCFS has on average 100 vacant positions over the past 5 years.







Ethics for Elected Officials

Online - Click here to register for this course offering May 22, 2025



This training will be held live on 5/22/25, online via Zoom, from 10am to 12pm.

Group discounts are not offered for the on-demand version.

Under North Carolina law, members of governing boards of cities, counties, local boards of education, unified governments, sanitary districts, and consolidated city-counties are required to receive at least two (2) clock hours of ethics training within twelve months after each election or appointment to office. The ethics training requirement is an ongoing obligation, triggered by each subsequent re-election or reappointment to office.

This online training will satisfy the 2 clock hours of local ethics training required by state law for elected and appointed officials. This training MUST be completed within 12 months of election day and is required every time they are re-elected or appointed and reappointed to a local office.

• Is your board attorney or a member of your board who is an attorney watching the webinar? The NC State Bar requires attorneys who wish to claim CLE (Continuing Legal Education) credit to purchase the webinar

separately in their name. The attorney must self-report to the State Bar for CLE credit.

What you need to know before you purchase:

A. If multiple incumbent board members need to receive their ethics training, you all should register via the group rates. Have your clerk or manager register you all as a group in a single transaction. If you need assistance, contact registration@sog.unc.edu.

B. Who this training does NOT cover:

Individuals serving on state boards subject to the State Government Ethics Act (SGEA): Local elected officials who also serve on a state board that is subject to the State Government Ethics Act (SGEA), including local community college boards, are required to take ethics training that is offered through the State Ethics Commission. The SOG ethics-training program for local elected officials does NOT satisfy the state ethics training, and the state ethics training does NOT satisfy the local elected official ethics-training which is offered through this page. Consequently, local elected officials who also serve on a state board subject to the SGEA, must take both the state and the local ethics training programs. Officials who need to complete state ethics training should:

- Contact their board's ethics liaison for training, or
- Complete the online training available on State Board of Elections and Ethics Enforcement (formerly the State Ethics Commission) website: ethics.ncsbe.gov/education/eduOnline

Local ABC Boards: For individuals who serve on a local ABC board, separate training is required. The SOG ethics training program for local elected officials does *NOT* satisfy the local ABC Board training, and the local ABC Board training does *NOT* satisfy the local elected officials ethic training. School Boards: Please contact the NC School Boards Association for further information.

C. Board notice of a public meeting:

Boards are advised to give public notice of a special meeting for ethics training sessions if a majority of the board might be in attendance at the event. This is in keeping with the spirit of the ethics law, and out of an abundance of caution

concerning the legal requirements for board meetings.

Purchasing the Webinar

A. Who should purchase from your unit:

- If you want to receive the group rate, have your clerk or manager register everyone in a single transaction.
- Is your board attorney or a member of your board who is an attorney watching the webinar? The NC State Bar requires attorneys who wish to claim CLE (Continuing Legal Education) credit to purchase the webinar separately in their name, and to self-report to the State Bard for CLE credit.
- Do you have to purchase the webinars for each person watching from your board? Yes.
- Adding no-reply@sog.unc.edu and lrich@sog.unc.edu to your contacts will increase the chance of the email getting through.
