#### **MINUTES**

#### WATAUGA COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS TUESDAY, JUNE 18, 2024

The Watauga County Board of Commissioners held a regular meeting, as scheduled, on Tuesday, June 18, 2024, at 5:30 P.M. in the Commissioners' Board Room located in the Watauga County Administration Building, Boone, North Carolina.

Chairman Turnbow called the meeting to order at 5:31 P.M. The following were present:

Charlie Wallin, Vice-Chairman Todd Castle, Commissioner Braxton Eggers, Commissioner Ray Russell, Commissioner Andrea Capua, County Attorney Deron Geouque, County Manager Anita J. Fogle, Clerk to the Board

Commissioner Castle opened with a prayer and Commissioner Eggers led the Pledge of Allegiance.

### APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Chairman Turnbow called for additions and/or corrections to the June 4, 2024, regular minutes and closed session minutes.

Commissioner Eggers, seconded by Vice-Chairman Wallin, moved to approve the June 4, 2024, regular meeting minutes as presented.

VOTE: Aye-5 Nay-0

Commissioner Eggers, seconded by Vice-Chairman Wallin, moved to approve the June 4, 2024, closed session minutes as presented.

VOTE: Aye-5 Nay-0

## **APPROVAL OF AGENDA**

Chairman Turnbow called for additions and/or corrections to the June 18, 2024, agenda.

County Manager Geouque requested to add a support letter request for a Forest Legacy Grant from Mr. Jeffrey Fisher regarding his proposed land donation for conservation purposes. The County Manager also requested to add Personnel Matters to the scheduled Closed Session.

Commissioner Castle, seconded by Vice-Chairman Wallin, moved to approve the June 18, 2024, agenda as amended.

VOTE: Aye-5 Nay-0

Gary Davenport requested more transparency.

Larry Dalot asked for the volume to be turned up.

#### NC GOVERNOR'S VOLUNTEER AWARDS PRESENTATION

Ms. Rebecca Hall, Executive Director of High Country United Way, presented the North Carolina Governor's Volunteer Service Award to each of the following winners for Watauga County: Recipient #1 was Nannette Clark; Recipient #2 was Fred and JoAnna Fonville; Recipient #3 was Misty Mayfield; Recipient #4 was Jean Rice; Recipient #5 was Dr. Jim Street; and Recipient #6 was the American Red Cross Disaster Action Leadership Team for the High Country. The presentation was for information only and, therefore, no action was required.

# SUPPORT LETTER REQUEST FOR FOREST LEGACY GRANT

Mr. Jeffrey Fisher, the owner of approximately 1,250 acres that spans Watauga and Caldwell Counties, requested a letter of support for a Forest Legacy Grant for the Buffalo Creek acquisition conservancy project. Mr. Fisher's 1,250 acres is comprised of ten parcels acquired over a ten year period. Funding for the conservation project would be 75% from the Forest Legacy Program and 25% in the form of a donation from Mr. Fisher. No State or local funding was required.

Commissioner Russell asked if there was a written proposal with budget information and Mr. Fisher responded that there was and he could send it to the Board for review. Commissioner Castle asked if the property was Federal Game Lands. Mr. Fisher stated that hunting and fishing were allowed. Commissioner Eggers stated that he would like to review the report as well.

Chairman Turnbow tabled consideration of a support letter and requested Mr. Fisher send the report to the County Manager who would place the request on the agenda for a future Board meeting.

# PROPOSED REVISION TO HOME & COMMUNITY CARE BLOCK GRANT (H&CCBG) FY 2024 ALLOCATION

Ms. Angie Boitnotte, Project on Aging Director, presented a proposed revision to the original allocation of the Home and Community Care Block Grant (H&CCBG) for FY 2024. The proposal was to decrease In-Home Aide Level II services by \$4,670 and increase Home Delivered Meals by \$4,670.

Commissioner Eggers, seconded by Vice-Chairman Wallin, moved to approve the revised Home and Community Care Block Grant (H&CCBG) as presented in the packet.

VOTE: Aye-5 Nay-0

#### TAX MONTHLY COLLECTIONS REPORT

Mr. Larry Warren, Tax Administrator, presented the May Monthly Collections Report. There were no refunds nor releases in May. The report was for information only and, therefore, no action was required.

### DISASTER RELIEF AND MITIGATION FUND GRANT AWARD

Mr. Will Holt, Emergency Services Director, presented a proposed grant agreement with North Carolina Emergency Management for the purpose of purchasing three weather stations, three flood gauges, and the expansion of the flood inundation library for an existing flood gauge. The total grant amount was \$40,239 with no match requirement.

Commissioner Russell, seconded by Commissioner Castle, moved to accept the grant from North Carolina Emergency Management in the amount of \$40,239.

## REQUEST FOR RPO RANKING OF TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS

Mr. Jason Walker, Planning and Inspections Director, presented the following 14 listed projects for possible inclusion in the 2026-2035 State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) of which he requested the Board rank in order of importance. In an effort to assist the Board, Mr. Walker reorganized the current list showing the order the projects were ranked last time. The rankings were due June 30, 2024.

1 Widen US 421 to Multi-Lanes from the Tennessee Line to US 321/421 junction near Vilas

- 2 Modernize Highway NC 194 Roadway (including construction of center turn lane and sidewalks from US 221/421 to Rainbow Trail) from US 421 to SR 1333 (Castle Ford Road)
- 3 Construct Middle Fork Greenway Section 5B along US 321 from the south of Jordan Cook Road to Watauga Medical Center with off-road/separated linear bicycle facility
- 4 Construct Middle Fork Greenway Section 5C along US 321 between Payne Branch Park and Goldmine Park with off-road/separated linear bicycle facility
- 5 Widen US 321 Truck, US 421 Truck, SR 1107 (NC 105 Bypass Road) to 3 lanes with 5-foot paved shoulders to accommodate bicycles
- 6 Improve intersection at Highway SR 1524 (Bamboo) and SR 1523 (Deerfield)
- 7 Widen Highway NC 105 to Multi-Lanes from 1136 (Clarks Creek Road) to US 221 in Avery County and upgrade arterial to signalized RCI Corridor
- 8 Construct interchange to improve safety on US 421 from SR 1416 to SR 1672 by upgrading at-grade intersection to interchange or grade separation
- 9 Improve intersection at US 321 and SR 1233 (Old US Hwy 421)
- 10 Construct roundabout to improve intersection at US 421 and SR 1180 (Poplar Grove Connector)
- 11 Construct freeway on new location south of the City of Boone at US 421 (Daniel Boone Parkway) to US 321/421 West of Boone
- 12 Construct freeway on new location south of the City of Boone at US 421 (Daniel Boone Parkway) from US 221/321 to US 221/421 East of Boone
- 13 Widen roadway to 3 lanes with 5-foot paved shoulders from SR 1568 (Old Shulls Mill Road) to J.H. Mclean Road
- 14 Construct greenway along US 321 north of Aho Road and south of Sterling Creek Park with the segment connecting to existing 2 miles of trail and including 2 bridges, parking area, river access, and trail

After discussion, and by consensus, the Board chose to prioritize the top five projects in the following order: #1, #2, #7, #3, and #4.

# RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF OPIOID SETTLEMENTS AND APPROVING THE SECOND SUPPLEMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDS

Ms. Andrea Capua, County Attorney, presented a resolution accepting the second supplemental agreement for additional opioid funds from the Kroger Settlement. Ms. Capua stated that by adopting the resolution, some funds would come to Watauga County.

Chairman Turnbow read the resolution.

Commissioner Russell, seconded by Commissioner Eggers, moved to adopt the resolution as presented and authorize the County Attorney and County Manager to sign documents needed for Court.

VOTE: Aye-5 Nay-0

# <u>DISCUSSION TO CONSIDER A REFERENDUM ADOPTING AN ALTERNATIVE STRUCTURE OF VOTING FOR WATAUGA COUNTY COMMISSIONERS</u>

Chairman Turnbow read a resolution to establish a referendum for the voters of Watauga County to alter the structure of the election of the Board of Commissioners. Three (3) maps were also presented for consideration.

Chairman Turnbow called for discussion.

Commissioner Castle, seconded by Commissioner Eggers, moved to table discussion until the July 2, 2024, meeting to see the progress of Senate Bill 912.

After discussion, the following vote was taken:

VOTE: Aye-2(Castle, Eggers) Nay-3(Turnbow, Russell, Wallin)

Of the three maps presented, Commissioner Russell stated that Option B was unworkable as District 1 was too large being spread from the Tennessee line to Deep Gap. He liked Option C less as it split Boone and spanned out, which made no sense, and was not cohesive. Commissioner Russell stated that he preferred Option A which had better population numbers; although it does leave Commissioners Russell and Wallin both in District 3.

After discussion, Chairman Turnbow, seconded by Commissioner Russell, moved to choose Map Option A to accompany the resolution establishing a referendum for the voters of Watauga County to alter the structure of the election of the Board of Commissioners.

VOTE: Aye-3(Turnbow, Wallin, Russell) Nay-2(Castle, Eggers) Chairman Turnbow stated that he would all Commissioners elected for four year terms and stated that there were four blanks to fill in the proposed resolution. The first blank would indicate Options A, B, & C. The second blank would say Map A and attached hereto. The third blank would say Map A. The fourth blank required discussion from the Board.

For the fourth blank, County Attorney Capua stated that wording would be chosen based on the new districts, not the people currently serving.

Commissioner Russell stated that in November, three Commissioners would each have a four-year term with the new map (Option A).

Therefore, there were two options.

The first resulted in the following two possibilities:

1) there would be one Commissioner is District 1, one in District 2, and one in District 3 with fouryear terms

Or . . .

2) there would be two Commissioners is District 1 and one Commissioner in District 3 with fouryear terms. Out of the second possibility, one of the two Commissioners in District 1 would be chosen randomly to serve as an At-Large member.

The second option would be for each of the three districts to have a four-year term and there would be a random drawing out of the three to fill an At-Large position so that there was one At-Large seat in each election cycle. Then in 2026 there would be one At-Large four-year term seat and one district four-year term seat.

Commissioner Castle stated that he and Commissioner Eggers have four-year terms currently and their terms wouldn't be cut short. Commissioner Russell stated that 2026 and 2028 would not be affected.

Chairman Turnbow stated that in District 1 there would be two elections with one going to At-Large. District 3 would not be impacted as both were running in District 3. In District 2 there is currently a Commissioner that will or will not be elected. If elected, then there would be another At-Large position. If not elected, then an At-Large would have to be chosen.

County Attorney Capua stated that she would need to draft the language for the forth blank and asked how the random selection of the At-Large position would be chosen. Vice-Chairman Wallin stated that the Statutes mention to flip a coin. Chairman Turnbow stated to flip a coin to decide. Commissioner Russell stated that he would like an At-Large position in each election cycle.

County Attorney Capua stated that she would draft the wording for the forth blank and circulate it tomorrow and asked for Commissioners to let her know immediately if there were questions or recommended changes.

Commissioner Russell stated that he had concerns about the understandability of the language on the ballot. County Attorney Capua stated that the Board had the authority to discuss it and she would determine that it did not go against Statutes.

County Attorney Capua suggested the follow re-wording for the ballot:

"Shall the structure of the Watauga County Board of Commissioners be changed to:
(a) Three electoral districts where commissioners living within a district are nominated and elected by qualified voters within that district and (b) Two at-large seats where qualified voters from the entire county nominate and elect commissioners to those two seats?"

Commissioner Russell, seconded by Vice-Chairman Wallin, moved to approve the changes to the resolution with the new wording for the ballot as presented by the County Attorney and the first blank filled in with "Options A, B, & C" and the second blank be filled in with "Map A" and attached hereto and the third blank be filled in with "Map A" and the fourth blank be filled in with wording drawn by the County Attorney as outlined by Commissioner Russell and Chairman Turnbow as discussed above.

VOTE: Aye-3(Turnbow, Wallin, Russell) Nay-2(Castle, Eggers)

Commissioner Russell, seconded by Vice-Chairman Wallin, moved to adopt the resolution to establish a referendum for the voters of Watauga County to alter the structure of the election of the Board of Commissioners as amended in the previous vote.

VOTE: Aye-3(Turnbow, Wallin, Russell) Nay-2(Castle, Eggers)

# MISCELLANEOUS ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

#### A. Proposed Renewal of NC State Highway Patrol Lease

County Manager Geouque stated that the lease for office space at the Law Enforcement Center for the North Carolina State Highway Patrol (NCSHP) was scheduled for renewal. The requested renewal amount was the same rate as the current amount of \$4,560 annually. The term of the lease was for a three (3) year period commencing on July 1, 2024 and ending June 30, 2027. County Attorney Capua stated that she had reviewed the lease and it was consistent with prior years.

Commissioner Castle, seconded by Commissioner Eggers, moved to approve the lease with the North Carolina State Highway Patrol (NCSHP) from July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2027.

VOTE: Aye-5 Nay-0

#### B. North Carolina Association of County Commissioners (NCACC) Legislative Goals

County Manager Geouque presented a copy of the NCACC's legislative goals with the top three priorities of the Association in 2023-2024 being:

- 1. Seek legislation, funding, and other efforts to expand digital infrastructure/broadband capability to the unserved and under-served areas and residents of the state.
- 2. Seek additional revenue sources to address statewide public school and community college capital needs and ensure methods used to distribute school capital funding considers the needs of both low-wealth and growing counties. Revisions to the Needs-Based Public School Capital Fund that will allow for more access to counties and allow for faster school construction to include allowing projects that have not previously been awarded a grant to commence and remain eligible for future grant application periods.
- 3. Support expansion of Medicaid as well as related funding and operational flexibility for counties to expand county workforce and necessary infrastructure.

Based on comments at a previous Board Meeting, the County Manager presented the following for consideration as Watauga County's Legislative Goals priorities for 2024-2025:

- 1. Amend 105-369(c) to allow counties to advertise delinquent taxes on the county website in lieu of a general circulation newspaper.
- 2. Seek additional revenue sources, including a statewide bond referendum and expanded lottery proceeds, and changes to the Needs-Based Public School Capital Fund, to equitably address statewide public school and community college capital challenges.
- 3. Increase state funding and support legislation for behavioral health services and facilities, including dedicated resources for community paramedicine projects; inpatient crisis beds; substance use disorders; specialty courts; individuals with mental health issues in county jails; and single stream funding for area authorities.
- 4. Seek legislation to give counties flexibility with use of occupancy taxes.

Discussion was held regarding a homestead tax exemption and it was requested to include that in the priorities as well. County Manager Geouque stated that he would work with the NCACC for wording for the priority.

Commissioner Eggers, seconded by Vice-Chairman Wallin, moved to approve the four priorities presented by the County Manager as well as an additional priority for a homestead tax exemption as worded by the County Manager with assistance from the NCACC.

VOTE: Aye-5 Nay-0

#### C. July Meeting Schedule

County Manager Geouque stated that historically, only one meeting was held in July due to all the work which had been done on the budget as well as the July 4<sup>th</sup> holiday. Also, historically, at the beginning of a new fiscal year there was limited business for the Board's consideration.

Commissioner Castle, seconded by Commissioner Russell, moved to cancel the July 2, 2024 regular meeting and hold the second meeting as currently scheduled for July 16, 2024.

VOTE: Aye-5 Nay-0

#### D. Boards and Commissions

County Manager Geouque presented the following for consideration:

#### Workforce Development Board

Ms. Misty Bishop-Price with the High Country Council of Governments Workforce Development Board (WDB) had indicated that Ms. Jessica Auten's appointment as a private sector member representing Watauga County would end on June 30, 2024. A new appointment was needed to fill this position as Ms. Auten had not been able to participate. The only person who has expressed interest in serving at this time was Mr. JD Kern who works with Blue Ridge Realty and was very involved in both the Boone and Blowing Rock Chambers of Commerce. However, Mr. Kern resides in Banner Elk. Ms. Bishop-Price stated that this has happened on the WDB where members represent one county while living in another.

Chairman Turnbow, seconded by Commissioner Eggers, moved to appoint Mr. JD Kern as a Watauga County private sector representative on the High County Workforce Development Board.

VOTE: Aye-5 Nay-0

#### LICENSE AGREEMENT

#### STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA

#### COUNTY OF WATAUGA

THIS LICENSE AGREEMENT (the "Agreement") is made as of <u>July 16, 2024</u>, by and between Watauga County, a corporate body politic, being hereinafter referred to as the "Licensor," and <u>Lucky Dog Vintage</u>, being hereinafter referred to as "Licensee".

#### STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

WHEREAS, Licensor is the owner of the parking lot and building of the Watauga County Human Services Center located at 132 Poplar Grove Connector, Boone NC 28607, hereinafter referred to as the "Property); and

WHEREAS, Licensee wants to use the parking lot to host its clothing market on Saturday, August 24, 2024; and

WHEREAS, Licensor and Licensee hereto desire to enter into an agreement to set forth their respective rights and obligations regarding use of and maintenance of the Property.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, the parties hereto do hereby agree as follows:

- 1. **Grant of License**. Licensor hereby grants to Licensee, subject to all of the terms and conditions hereof, a license to use the Property to host its clothing market on August 24, 2024 for itself, its clients, customers, patrons, other related invitees and the general public. However, Licensee does not have the rights granted herein to the exclusion of the rights of the Licensor to use the Property in any matter it wishes so long as it does not unreasonably impede the use of the Property by Licensee for the purpose stated herein.
- 2. **Personal License Only.** It is agreed between Licensor and Licensee that this license is personal to Licensee and shall not inure to the successors or assigns of Licensee.
- 3. **Licensee Has No Interest or Estate.** Licensee agrees that it does not and shall not claim at any time any interest or estate of any kind or extent whatsoever in the Property, or any portion thereof, by virtue of this license or Licensee's occupancy or use hereunder and Licensor conveys no interest in the Property to Licensee by this Agreement.
- 4. **Use of the Property**. The Licensor shall collect the garbage from the containers on the Property at 6:00 pm on August 24, 2024, at which time this License shall automatically terminate. The Licensee shall keep the Property in a good state of repair and in a safe condition during its use. Any repairs or other changes made by Licensee shall require the prior consent of Licensor and shall be at the sole cost and expense of

Licensee. The Licensee shall pay to Licensor Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for its use of the Property.

- 5. **Indemnification.** Licensee shall indemnify and hold Licensor, jointly and severally, its agents, servants, employees, invitees, representatives and their respective heirs, successors and assigns, harmless from and against any and all claims, demands, actions, liabilities or expenses concerning bodily injury or death, damage to the Property resulting from, or in any way connected with, the condition or use of the Property by Licensee, its invitees, customers, guests and the general public during the use of the Property. - 7. **Modification.** The terms, covenants, conditions and provisions of this License Agreement may be extended, abrogated, modified, rescinded or amended in whole or in part only with the consent of Licensor and Licensee and only in writing.
- 8. **Applicable Law.** This Agreement shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the State of North Carolina.

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- 11. **Waiver.** No waiver of any condition, covenant or restriction of this Agreement by either party shall be deemed to imply or constitute a further waiver of the same or any other condition or covenant of this Agreement.
- 12. **Captions.** The captions of the various paragraphs of this Agreement are for convenience only and are not a part of this Agreement and do not in any way limit or amplify the terms and provisions of this Agreement.



#### **GENERAL DESCRIPTION**

The Buffalo Creek WRC FEE SIMPLE ACQUISITION of 1,218 acres (Property) by the NC Wildlife Resources Commission (WRC) in Western NC represents a unique opportunity to protect one of the last remaining large and contiguously-owned properties in a rapidly-growing area in Watauga County that is in the top 15% by tourist revenue of all 100 counties in NC. Development pressures in the area are intense due to increasing population and second home/tourism housing demands. The Property includes some of the highest quality aquatic habitat for 27 NC species of greatest conservation need and 8 federally listed nonaquatic T&E species. Specifically, the Property has prime aquatic habitat for existing Native Brook Trout in terms of high genetic diversity and density of populations. The Property represents a "link" between two non-contiguous WRC properties

creating a nearly 3,000 acre public land asset that will be managed and used by the public in addition to being visible from the Blue Ridge Parkway, the most visited National Park Site in the U.S. This fleeting opportunity necessitates a quick response with IRA funding due to the owner continually receiving verbal offers to purchase portions of the Property for residential development.

#### PROJECT FEATURES

#### **Important**

- RECREATION ECONOMIC IMPACT: The Property will be managed for public use by WRC for activities that include hunting, mountain trout fishing, trapping, bird watching, hiking, and other outdoor related activities that also prioritize the ecological health of pristine headwater streams.
- In 2023, the WRC reported that each dollar anglers spend to fish for mountain trout in North Carolina returns \$1.93 to its economy and results in a \$1.38 billion impact to the state. Also, number of trout anglers in the state increased from 18.5% to 32% of all licensed anglers from 2014 to 2023.
- The mountain trout fishing opportunities on the Property will make an excellent addition to WRC's
  Mountain Heritage Trout Waters Program, which is a cooperative effort between the WRC and local
  governments to encourage trout fishing as a heritage tourism activity in western NC cities.

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- VisitNC.com reports that tourists spent over \$500M in Watauga County in 2022, which is the 15th highest amount spent of all 100 NC counties statewide and furthermore, monies spent on recreation in the county totaled \$43M which is also the 15th highest amount spent of all 100 NC counties statewide.
- WRC reports that resident and non-resident hunters provide over \$1.6B to NC's economy. More importantly, these dollars provide badlyneeded revenue throughout many rural areas of NC. Small "mom and pop" stores, motels, gas stations, and other establishments deeply appreciate hunter dollars.




Proximity to major metro areas, sources of second/tourism housing demand in area (Photo by Michael Scisco)

- SCENIC RECREATION: The Property is within the viewshed from multiple locations along the Blue Ridge Parkway (BRP). The BRP is a National Park administered by the US National Park Service (NPS) and its primary purpose is to provide breathtaking views of the Appalachian Mountains in VA and NC.
- The BRP is one of three National Parks that regularly sees over 10 million visitors each year on par with Golden Gate National Recreation Area and Great Smoky Mountains National Park. In fact BRP over recent years has typically topped the list as the most visited National Park Sites in the U.S.
- The NPS reports that BRP had 16.7M visitors in 2023, an increase of 6% or 1M visitors from 2022. In 2023 one section of the BRP less than 2 miles from the Property, saw a vehicle count of 556,302, a 7.3% rise from 2022. This indicates over a half million visitors contributed to the local economy.
- FEDERAL LISTED SPECIES: These species are known to occur within Watauga County: ENDANGERED: Gray bat, Virginia big-eared bat, Indiana bat, Northern flying squirrel. THREATENED: Northern Long-eared Bat. The Property includes old growth forests, which are critical to high quality forested bat habitat.
- Specifically, the Virginia big-eared bat's range is primarily in Watauga and Caldwell Counties. The WRC Conservation Plan for the Virginia Big-eared Bat finds that increased development has the potential to negatively impact foraging habitat and create a barrier for migration.
- STATE LISTED SPECIES: There are 313 state listed species that occur in Watauga County. 29 are
  Endangered and 23 are Threatened (total of 52 species) with the remaining species under other
  levels of protection or conservation need. WRC property management will encourage species habitat
  improvements.
- Native Brook Trout (a Species of Greatest Conservation Need in NC) are present on the Property.
   Unlike other Brook Trout populations in the Yadkin River Basin, Brook Trout on the Property have high diversity and exist at higher densities. There are about 7 miles of trout streams on the Property.
- According to WRC Native Brook Trout within the Property exhibit some of the highest genetic diversity in the Yadkin River Basin; there is little evidence of hatchery introgression (non-native Brook Trout), which is rare in the basin; and populations also exhibit high-density fishery characteristics.
- NC also measures Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN). In the Yadkin River Basin, there
  are 27 aquatic species that are SGCN. Native Brook Trout are listed as a SGCN with the Property
  providing significant habitat to retain and improve genetic diversity and greater density of this species.
- WATER QUALITY & WATERSHED PROTECTION: The Property includes over 35,000 linear feet or nearly 7 miles of pristine headwater streams of the Buffalo Creek Watershed, a significant native Brook Trout cool stream mountain headwater stream complex.
- The Property's pristine headwater streams have been identified by the NC Dept. of Environmental
  Quality as having a High Surface Water Susceptibility for Drinking Water to downstream users. The
  larger basin has a population of 1.6M people that rely on clean, upstream sources of drinking water.
- CONSERVATION NEED: According to WRC acquisition of the Property would increase the
  percentage of protected land within the upper Yadkin River Basin. Currently, only 22% of its acreage
  is protected, which is minimal compared to 66% protected acreage in the neighboring Catawba River
  Basin.

- CLIMATE RESILIENCE: The climate resilience of the Property was measured using The Nature Conservancy's Resilient Land Mapping Tool. A majority of the Property is in the "More Resilient" category (second highest resiliency) with a "Climate-informed Concentrated Flow" of animal and plant populations.
- READINESS: The landowner and WRC are committed to completing this project within one to two
  years from award date. Phasing the conservation of the Property is not possible due to the
  landowner's time and financial limitations, this round of IRA funding is critical to the success of this
  project.
- LOCAL SUPPORT: We believe any conservation project should rely on local support for its success.
   Many of our letters of support are from local businesses that rely on recreation and tourism in
   Watauga County and are seeing development diminish the natural and recreational resources they
   rely on.

#### **Threatened**

- CONVERSION THREAT: Mountain residential communities, and more specifically ridgeline developments, are a significant threat to the Property. The sale of the Property to WRC will perpetually protect the Property from ridgeline and other mountain residential development and non-forested land uses.
- There are 13 active residential/second home developments within one mile of the Property. 730 of the 925 tax parcels within this one mile buffered perimeter of the Property are smaller than 10 acres. According to the U.S. Census, NC was 3rd in the U.S. for total population growth from 2022-2023.
- The Blue Ridge Mountain Club (BRMC) is directly adjacent to the Property and has over 6,000 homesites. As recently as July of 2022, BRMC cut the ribbon on a new 400 homesite neighborhood called The Meadows and continues to sell homesites and homes at a rapid pace.

- Second and vacation home demand is high in the area due to the tourism trade and second home buyers from Raleigh/Durham and Charlotte areas. In fact, Airbnb hosting revenue in Watauga Co. topped \$36 million in 2022, second only to Dare County (the Outer Banks beach resort area) for all NC counties.
- According to the National Association of REALTORS Research Group, Watauga Co. was a "Top 1% Vacation Home County" for all of the U.S. in 2020, ranking #27 in a statistically rigorous study of 1,205 counties. Also, NC has the third highest population growth of any state in the country from 2022-2023.
- Other top 30 areas in the REALTOR 2020 analysis include: Fort Myers/Naples FL, Cape Cod/Nantucket MA, Flagstaff AZ, the Catskills/Hudson Valley of NY, Lake of the Ozarks, MO, and several ski resort areas in VT and NM. Watauga Co. is on par with these popular areas for vacation home desirability.
- Second homes, luxury homes, and investment buyers drove the High Country's 2023 real estate market. 47.6 percent of all property and landowners in Watauga County had their tax cards mailed to addresses out of the county. (2023 Q4 Chamber of Commerce Economic Indicators Report).
- The current owner is prepared (at this moment) to donate an in-kind match exceeding \$4 million to facilitate a conservation sale. This fleeting opportunity necessitates a quick response with IRA funding. The owner has received verbal offers to sell portions of the Property for residential uses.
- ZONING/LACK OF PROTECTIONS: There are no legal protections on the Property that would limit
  any threats of conversion, subdivision and development. The Property could be subdivided into 10acre residential lots with a network of roads and utilities and minimal approvals from Watauga Co.
  planning.

There is potential for ridgeline development which includes the most desirable homesites on NC
mountain properties due to expansive views. The NC Mountain Ridge Protection Act doesn't protect
any ridges on the Property from this type of development since all of the ridges are under 3,000 feet.

#### **Strategic**

- MISSING CONSERVATION LINK: The
  acquisition of the Property will connect 1,000
  acres of existing WRC property (Buffalo Cove
  Game Land) and 700 acres currently being
  pursued for acquisition by WRC (funding in
  hand). It is the missing link connecting these
  lands to form a block of conservation and
  recreation lands owned by WRC in the
  immediate vicinity of nearly 3,000 contiguous
  acres.
- CONSERVATION PLAN, REGIONAL: Nearly all of the Property is designated "Highest Priority" conservation land as well as a "continental inland corridor" and "hub" according to the SE Conservation Blueprint which identifies priority areas based on a suite of 61 natural and cultural resource indicators representing terrestrial, freshwater, and marine ecosystems.

- The Property is located within the Southern Appalachian High Country Focal Landscape
  - which is part of a landscape conservation initiative by Appalachian Mountains Joint Venture and The Nature Conservancy. It is an area of exceptional biodiversity that is unparalleled in the Eastern U.S. Despite many conservation successes, the region remains under significant threat from development pressure.
- The Blue Ridge Parkway ("BRP") General Management Plan (2013) identifies the prioritization of land protection projects to conserve quality scenic views. Watauga County has a Voluntary Farmland Preservation Program ordinance which encourages conservation of forest lands greater than 20 acres in size.
- CONSERVATION INITIATIVE, STATE: The Property is within a National Audubon Society Important Bird Area, the "Northern Escarpment", an area comprising the eastern edge of the Blue Ridge that is "under tremendous development pressure as there is little public land in the area." Primary threats in the IBA are "second-home development, resort development, timbering, and water pollution."
- According to the NC Trout Resources Management Plan (WRC 2013) "Threats to trout habitat
  include land-disturbing activities associated with residential developments" and WRC has a goal to
  "seek access opportunities on private lands through memorandum of agreement, lease, easement, or
  fee-simple purchase." This project meets both of these criteria as being under threat and offering a
  solution.
- The NC Outdoor Recreation Plan (2020) states "acquisition of unique natural areas and watersheds that are at risk of development" as a priority. And "obtaining funding for land acquisition" and "multiparcel acquisitions with multiple landowners" are challenges to providing quality outdoor recreation opportunities for NC. This project addresses both the priority and challenges posed by the plan.
- According to the NC State Forest Action Plan (2020), notable resources needed to meet goals of the
  plan include "Increased forestland protection through easements, programs and land acquisitions."
  The plan also states that metrics to measure success include "Acres of priority habitat and/or
  landscapes conserved through land protection (ex. fee simple acquisition).
- The Property is near and within view of the Mountains-to-Sea (MTS) State Trail, a 1,175 mile long trail system stretching across NC. Similar to the Blue Ridge Parkway, the Property provides unencumbered mountain views for visitors who hike and bike along the MTS.

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DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES: The Property contains the headwaters to Buffalo Creek and its
protection will improve water quality for downstream users in Caldwell County and will secure a safe
water source for multiple disadvantaged communities located downstream and within the Yadkin
River Basin.

#### **Special Emphasis Criteria**

- HIGH AQUATIC RESOURCE IMPACT- The aquatic resources on the Property are exceptional
  providing high-quality habitats that contain genetically diverse and dense native Brook Trout
  populations as well as habitat for 26 other aquatic species of greatest conservation need. Protecting
  this Property through IRA funding will provide long-term preservation impacts to resident fauna and
  those downstream.
- CLIMATE RESILIENCE: The Property was measured using The Nature Conservancy's Resilient
  Land Mapping Tool. A majority of the Property is in the "More Resilient" category (second highest
  resiliency) and is also "Resilient" with a "Climate-informed Concentrated Flow" of animal and plant
  populations. The Property scored high in "Landscape Diversity" which measures microhabitats and
  climate gradients.
- CARBON SEQUESTRATION- The Nature Conservancy's Resilient Mapping Tool measures Potential Forest Ecosystem Carbon Sequestration (2010-2050). The tool estimates existing carbon stocks and then assumes no disturbance from 2010-2050. The tool shows the Property has the capacity to sequester up to 20 metric tons of carbon/ac/year which would offset carbon for nearly 5,000 cars per year in perpetuity.
- HABITAT CONNECTIVITY The Nature Conservancy's Resilient Mapping Tool measures
  "Concentrated Flow climate informed linkages" with the Property in this status, which is defined as:
  areas where large quantities of flow are concentrated through a narrow area. Because of their
  importance in maintaining flow across a larger network, these pinch points are good candidates for
  land conservation.
- DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES: Conservation of the Property Protects high quality sources of water supply and water quality to multiple disadvantaged communities downstream in Caldwell County. These areas exceed the threshold percentile for multiple socioeconomic factors including: agricultural loss rate, population loss rate, low income, transportation barriers, and low high school education rates.
- HIGH LEVERAGE: The landowner has committed to donate 25% of the appraised value of the Property, which is expected to exceed \$4 million. This is important since the landowner could sell the Property on the open market and receive full value. They are willing to sell at a steep discount to help conserve this landscape for all North Carolinians rather than being pressured to sell to developers.
- EFFICIENCY OF SCALE: A majority of the land parcels within one mile of the Property are less than 10 acres in size. At over 1,200 acres, the Property represents one of the last remaining large, contiguously-owned land parcels in the area. Conserving the Property now will ensure this large block of forested land remains undeveloped and open to the public for recreational purposes forever.
- HIGH READINESS: The landowner is willing and able to sell the Property as soon as possible. We
  prefer to close the transaction within one year of funds being awarded to the project. The landowner
  is continuously receiving inquiries from developers to sell portions of the Property and they are eager
  to sell to WRC to relieve that economic pressure to sell risking conversion to non-forested uses.
- STEWARDSHIP CAPACITY The WRC has adequate funding and management staff to steward the Property for public recreational use and ensure that forest health and succession are top priorities for property management activities. WRC is a land management agency that manages well over 2,000,000 acres of public and private lands in North Carolina for multiple public uses.
- EXPANDED ACCESS FOR GROWING POPULATION/VISITATION: The Property will provide a new
  outdoor recreation resource in a the rapidly growing local communities of Blowing Rock and Boone,
  NC. This area is also a tourism resource due to its close proximity to major metropolitan markets
  including a 1.5 hour drive from Charlotte (NC), 3 hour drive from Raleigh (NC), and a 4.5 hour drive
  from Atlanta (GA).
- CONSERVATION LINKAGE & LEVERAGE: the Property acts as a "link" between 1,000 acres of land already owned by WRC and another 700 acres of land currently being acquired by WRC. The protection of the Property using IRA funding is linking up nearly 3,000 acres of contiguously-owned WRC land for public use and recreation. Without this "link" WRC lands will be fragmented and difficult to access.

The Property is the headwaters of the "Buffalo Creek Connector" where WRC is working to put together conservation lands along Buffalo Creek and its tributaries (see regional map). Headwater areas are critical to preserving water supply and quality for downstream aquatic habitats and human communities. Preserving this corridor will help ensure high quality, contiguous Native Brook Trout habitat.







D. Appraisal Services Contract

#### **MANAGER'S COMMENTS:**

Mr. Warren will request Board approval of the contract with Vincent Valuations to provide appraisal services. The effective date of the contract will be January 1, 2025 to coincide with the retirement of the County's last employed appraiser. Funds have been budgeted and approved by the Board with the adoption of the Fiscal Year 2025 budget. The term of the contract is for three (3) years. Vincent Valuations already provides the majority of appraisal services for the County and the new contract will fold the existing contract into one.

Board approval is required to adopt the contract with Vincent Valuations for appraisal services.

#### NORTH CAROLINA WATAUGA COUNTY

#### SERVICE CONTRACT

**THIS CONTRACT** is made, and entered into this the \_\_\_\_\_day of <u>June</u>, 2024, by and between the **COUNTY of WATAUGA**, a political subdivision of the State of North Carolina, (hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY"), and **Vincent Valuations LLC** a corporation duly authorized to do business in the state of North Carolina, (hereinafter referred to as "CONTRACTOR").

For and in consideration of mutual promises to each as herein after set forth, the parties hereto do mutually agree as follows:

- 1. SCOPE OF SERVICES. CONTRACTOR hereby agrees to provide the services and/or materials under this contract pursuant to the provisions and specifications identified herein. Time is of the essence with respect to all provisions of this contract that specify a time for performance.
  - Audit 300 PUV parcels per tax year. This includes sending compliance letters to the owner, reviewing data for compliance and completing rollbacks and necessary.
  - Complete the valuation of 400 splits and merges of land per tax year.
  - Inspect, data enter and value 2400 new construction parcels per tax year.
  - Provide appraisal support staff to review office inquiries regarding appraisal related issues. This shall not
    include personal property, listing, collection or mapping related work. Office staff will be present in the
    office at least once a day to respond to inquiries and messages.
  - Complete 50 non reappraisal related appeals per tax year up to and including the County Board of Equalization and Review.
  - The COUNTY agrees to pay the CONTRACTOR \$200,000 per year for the above services. Any item exceeding the above-said number shall be invoiced at a rate of \$650 per day.
  - Beginning July 1, 2025, COUNTY agrees to increase the Fee in an amount equal to cost-of-livingadjustment (COLA) raises provided to COUNTY employees. This increase will be in effect from July 1, 2025, to June 30, 2026.
  - Beginning July 1, 2026, COUNTY agrees to further increase the Fee in an amount equal to COLA raises provided to COUNTY employees. This increase will be in effect from July 1, 2026, through June 30, 2027
  - Beginning July 1, 2027, COUNTY agrees to further increase the Fee in an amount equal to COLA raises provided to COUNTY employees. This increase will be in effect from July 1, 2027, through the remainder of the Contract.
  - In the event that the contract is extended for additional three-year terms pursuant to paragraph 2 of this contract, the COLA Fee increases described in the preceding three bullet points will apply to each subsequent year that the contract remains in effect.
- **2. TERM OF CONTRACT.** The Term of this contract for services is from 1/1/2025 to 6/30/2028 unless sooner terminated as provided herein. This contract will automatically renew for additional three-year terms at the conclusion of this contract term and subsequent contract terms unless the COUNTY or CONTRACTOR terminates the renewal at least 180 days prior to the last day of the contract term.
- **3. PAYMENT TO CONTRACTOR.** COUNTY agrees to pay CONTRACTOR at the rates specified for Services performed to the satisfaction of the COUNTY, in accordance with this contract. Unless otherwise specified, CONTRACTOR shall submit an itemized invoice to COUNTY by the end of the month during which Services are performed. A Funds Reservation number may be assigned to encumber the funds associated with this contract and must appear on all invoices and correspondence mailed to Purchaser. Payment will be processed promptly upon receipt and approval of the invoice by COUNTY.
- **4. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR.** COUNTY and CONTRACTOR agree that CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor and shall not represent itself as an agent or employee of COUNTY for any purpose in the performance of CONTRACTOR's duties under this Contract. Accordingly, CONTRACTOR shall be

responsible for payment of all federal, state and local taxes as well as business license fees arising out of CONTRACTOR's activities in accordance with this Contract. For purposes of this contract taxes shall include, but not be limited to, Federal and State Income, Social Security and Unemployment Insurance taxes.

CONTRACTOR, as an independent contractor, shall perform the Services required hereunder in a professional manner and in accordance with the standards of applicable professional organizations and licensing agencies.

5. INDEMNIFICATION. To the fullest extent permitted by laws and regulations, CONTRACTOR shall indemnify and hold harmless the COUNTY and its officials, agents, and employees from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, direct, indirect, or consequential (including but not limited to fees and charges of engineers or architects, attorneys, and other professionals and costs related to court action or mediation) arising out of or resulting from CONTRACTOR's performance of this Contract or the actions of the CONTRACTOR or its officials, employees, or subcontractors under this Contract or under contracts entered into by the CONTRACTOR in connection with this Contract. This indemnification shall survive the termination of this Contract.

In claims against any person or entity indemnified under this provision by an employee of the CONTRACTOR, a subcontractor, an employee of a subcontractor, or an agent of the CONTRACTOR or a subcontractor, the indemnification obligation under this provision shall not be limited by a limitation on amount or type of damages, compensation or benefits payable by or for the CONTRACTOR or a subcontractor under workers' or workmen's compensation acts, disability benefit acts or other employee benefit acts.

- 6. INSURANCE. CONTRACTOR shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract the following insurance coverage from an insurance company(s) licensed to do business in North Carolina. All of the policies required of the CONTRACTOR shall contain a waiver of subrogation provision to waive all rights of recovery under subrogation or otherwise against the COUNTY. In the event CONTRACTOR'S Insurance Policy or Certificate of Insurance conflicts with the aforesaid language concerning "waiver of subrogation" this contract shall govern. CONTRACTOR shall advise the COUNTY of any cancellation, non-renewal, or material change in any policy within ten (10) days of notification of such action and provide updated certificates of insurance evidencing renewals within fifteen (15) days of expiration. CONTRACTOR'S insurance shall be primary and any insurance or self-funded liability programs maintained by the COUNTY shall not contribute with respect to the CONTRACTOR's insurance. COUNTY shall not be listed as an additional insured on any Insurance Policy or Certificate of Insurance of the CONTRACTOR. In the event CONTRACTOR'S Insurance Policy or Certificate of Insurance conflicts with the aforesaid language concerning "additional insured" this contract shall govern.
  - **6.1 Commercial General Liability**: Insurance Services Office (ISO) Form CG 00 01 on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury, and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than **\$1,000,000** per occurrence and **\$1,000,000** aggregate.
  - **6.2 Commercial Automobile Liability**: ISO Form CA 00 01 covering any auto with limit not less than **\$1,000,000** per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
  - **6.3 Worker's Compensation and Employers Liability**: as required by The State of North Carolina, with statutory limits, and Employers Liability Insurance with a limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence.

By requiring insurance herein, the COUNTY does not represent that coverage and limits will necessarily be adequate to protect CONTRACTOR, and such coverage and limits shall not be deemed as a limitation on CONTRACTOR's liability under the indemnities granted to the COUNTY in this Contract. CONTRACTOR shall provide the COUNTY a valid certificate of insurance, in advance of the performance of any work, exhibiting coverage required. CONTRACTOR shall require and verify that all subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein.

The failure of the COUNTY at any time to enforce the insurance provisions, to demand such certificates of insurance, or to identify a deficiency shall not constitute a waiver of those provisions, nor reduce obligations of the CONTRACTOR to maintain such insurance or to meet its obligations under the indemnification provisions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing contained in this section shall be deemed to constitute a waiver of the governmental immunity of the COUNTY, which immunity is hereby reserved to the COUNTY.

- 7. TERMINATION. This Contract may be terminated by the COUNTY for cause only, which shall consist only of the failure of CONTRACTOR to provide Services to the reasonable satisfaction of COUNTY due to intentional or grossly negligent conduct by CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR may terminate this Contract without penalty if its ability to perform is obstructed by malfunction of COUNTY's computers or software used in connection with this Contract.
- **8. COUNTY NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR EXPENSES.** COUNTY shall not be liable to CONTRACTOR for any expenses paid or incurred by CONTRACTOR, unless otherwise agreed in writing.
- **9. EQUIPMENT.** CONTRACTOR shall supply, at its sole expense, all equipment, tools, materials, and/or supplies required to provide Services hereunder, unless otherwise agreed in writing.
- 10. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS. CONTRACTOR shall abide by all statutes, rules, regulations, laws, and executive orders Federal, State and Local as they relate to, but are not limited to, (i) services in general, (ii) payment of employees, subcontractors and agents, (iii) the Fair Labor Standards Act and (iv) the Wage and Hour Division. In the event CONTRACTOR is determined by the final order of a court or appropriate agency to be in violation of any Federal, State or Local statute, rule, regulation, law or executive order or this provision, this Contract may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part by COUNTY and CONTRACTOR may be declared ineligible for further COUNTY contracts.
- 11. HEALTH AND SAFETY. CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for initiating, maintaining and supervising all safety precautions and programs required by OSHA and all other regulatory agencies while providing Services under this Contract.
- 12. NON-DISCRIMINATION IN EMPLOYMENT. CONTRACTOR shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of age, sex, race, creed, national origin, or disability. CONTRACTOR shall take affirmative action to ensure that qualified applicants are employed and that employees are treated fairly and legally during employment with regard to their age, sex, race, creed, national origin, or disability. In the event CONTRACTOR is determined by the final order of an appropriate agency or court to be in violation of any non-discrimination provision of federal, state or local law or this provision, this Contract may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part by COUNTY, and CONTRACTOR may be declared ineligible for further COUNTY contracts.
- **13. AUDIT RIGHTS.** For all Services being provided hereunder, COUNTY shall have the right to inspect, examine, and make copies of any and all books, accounts, invoices, records and other writings relating to the performance of the Services. Audits shall take place at times and locations mutually agreed upon by both parties. Notwithstanding the foregoing, CONTRACTOR must make the materials to be audited available within one (1) week of the request for them.
- 14. DISPUTE RESOLUTION PROCEDURE. To prevent disputes and litigation, it is agreed by the parties that any claim or dispute between COUNTY and the CONTRACTOR, arising from this Agreement or the services and/or materials being provided by the CONTRACTOR, shall be sent to the WATAUGA County Manager who shall appoint a qualified mediator to address the issue. Such request shall be submitted to the County Manager in writing within ten (10) days of the claim or dispute. Upon receipt of a timely written claim, the Manager, or his designee, shall notify the Mediator who will conduct a mediation and notify the CONTRACTOR in writing

of the decision within forty five (45) calendar days from the date of the submission of the claim or dispute, unless the Mediator requires additional time to gather information or allow the parties to provide additional information. The Mediator's orders, decisions and decrees shall be non-binding. Mediation, pursuant to this provision, shall be a pre-condition to initiating litigation concerning the dispute. During the pendency of any dispute and after a determination thereof, parties to the dispute shall act in good faith to mitigate any potential damages including utilization of schedule changes and alternate means of providing services and/or materials. The costs of mediation shall be divided equally between parties to the dispute.

The mediation session shall be private and shall be held in WATAUGA County, North Carolina. Mediation under this provision shall not be the cause for a delay of services and/or materials being provided which is the focus of the dispute.

If the disputed issue cannot be resolved in mediation or either party disagrees with the results of the mediation, the parties may seek resolution in the General Court of Justice in the County of WATAUGA and the State of North Carolina. If a party fails to comply in strict accordance with the requirements of this provision, the noncomplying party specifically waives all of its rights provided hereunder, including its rights and remedies under State law.

- 15. EXISTENCE. CONTRACTOR warrants that it is a corporation or otherwise legal entity duly organized, validly existing, and in good standing under the laws of the State of North Carolina and is duly qualified to do business in the State of North Carolina and has full power and authority to enter into and fulfill all the terms and conditions of this contract.
- **16**. **NON-SOLICITATION.** During the period of agreement and for the period of twelve months following the project completion date, the COUNTY will not solicit for employment or hire any COMPANY employee without the express written consent of the COMPANY.
- 17. FORCE MAJEURE. In no event shall the CONTRACTOR be responsible or liable for any failure or delay in the performance of its obligations hereunder arising out of or caused by, directly or indirectly, forces beyond its control, including, without limitation, strikes, work stoppages, extreme periods of inflation, accidents, acts of war or terrorism, civil or military disturbances, nuclear or natural catastrophes or acts of God, and interruptions, loss or malfunctions of utilities, communications or computer (software and hardware) services; it being understood that the CONTRACTOR shall use reasonable efforts which are consistent with accepted practices in the appraisal industry to resume performance as soon as practicable under the circumstances.
- **18. CORPORATE AUTHORITY.** By execution hereof, the person signing for CONTRACTOR below certifies that he/she has read this contract and that he/she is duly authorized to execute this contract on behalf of the CONTRACTOR.
- 19. SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS. CONTRACTOR shall not assign its interest in this Contract without the written consent of COUNTY. CONTRACTOR has no authority to enter into contracts on behalf of COUNTY.
- **20. NOTICES.** All notices which may be required by this contract or any rule of law shall be effective when received by certified mail sent to the following addresses:

- **21. HEADINGS.** The subject headings of the sections are included for purposes of convenience only and shall not affect the construction or interpretation of any of its provisions. This contract shall be deemed to have been drafted by both parties and no interpretation shall be made to the contrary.
- **22. GOVERNING LAW.** This Contract shall be governed by and in accordance with the laws of the State of Nort1 Carolina. All actions relating in any way to this Contract shall be brought in the General Court of Justice in the County of WATAUGA and the State of North Carolina.
- **23. ENTIRE CONTRACT.** This contract shall constitute the entire understanding between COUNTY and CONTRACTOR and shall supersede all prior understandings and agreements relating to the subject matter hereof and may be amended only by written mutual agreement of the parties.
- **24. COMPUTER ACCESS.** The county shall provide remote access to the county's CAMA system, Tyler IAS, along with any other relevant databases required to complete data entry work such as Survey 123.

As part of the Hardin Creek Restoration Project, the County, as the land owner, is required to record a Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions on the property project. The County Attorney is to draft the Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions, after which the NC Land and Water Fund, Division of Land and Water Stewardship will review and approve.

Board approval is required to accept the Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions on the portion of the High School property impacted by the project.

### RECITALS AND CONSERVATION PURPOSES

- **A.** The Declarant is a unit of local government and accepts responsibility for enforcing the terms of this Restoration Declaration and for upholding its conservation purposes forever.
- **B.** The Declarant is the sole owner in fee simple of certain real property containing 6.119 acres more or less, located in New River Township, Watauga County, North Carolina, and more particularly described in <u>Exhibit "A</u>," attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference (hereinafter the "Property").

- C. The State of North Carolina ("State") enacted the Uniform North Carolina Conservation and Historic Preservation Agreements Act (the "Conservation Agreements Act"), Chapter 121, Article 4 of the North Carolina General Statutes ("NCGS"), which provides for enforceability of restrictions, easements, covenants, or conditions "appropriate for retaining in land or water areas predominantly in their natural, scenic, or open condition . . . .".
- **D.** This Restoration Declaration is intended to be a "conservation agreement" and/or a "preservation agreement" as defined and contemplated in the Conservation Agreements Act.
- **E.** The North Carolina Land and Water Fund (the "Fund"), an independent agency of the State with its address at 1651 Mail Service Center, Raleigh, North Carolina 27699-1651, is authorized by NCGS Chapter 113A, Article 18, to provide funding for projects and to acquire land and interests in land for riparian buffers for the purposes of protecting surface waters and urban drinking water supplies.
- F. The Declarant is party to an agreement with the Fund through which it has received a grant from the Fund, identified as Grant Contract no. 2022-430 (the "Grant Contract"), entered into between the Declarant and the Fund effective \_\_\_\_\_\_, for improving water quality by restoring Hardin Creek on or bordering the Property and restoring and/or protecting riparian buffers on the Property (the "Restoration Project").
- **G.** The Declarant and the Fund have determined that water quality will benefit by implementation of the Restoration Project and subsequent protection and maintenance of riparian resources and other natural values on the Property (the "Conservation Values").
- **H.** In order to protect and maintain the Conservation Values, the Declarant wishes to restrict and limit in perpetuity activities on and uses of the Property that could conflict with the Conservation Values, such restrictions and limitations applying only to that portion of the Property shown on the map of survey dated July 11, 2024 entitled "Conservation Easement Survey for Watauga County" (the "Protection Area"), attached hereto as <u>Exhibit "B"</u> and hereby made a part of this document, to the terms, conditions and purposes hereinafter set forth.
- **NOW, THEREFORE,** the Declarant hereby unconditionally and irrevocably declares that the Protection Area will be held and subject to the following restrictions, covenants and conditions as set out herein, to run with the subject real property and be binding on all parties that have or may have any right, title, or interest in said property.

#### ARTICLE I. DURATION OF RESTORATION DECLARATION

The covenants, conditions, and restrictions contained in this Restoration Declaration are permanent and perpetual, run with the land, and are be binding on the Declarant and its successors and assigns as owner of the Property and on all those claiming by, through, or under each such owner, in perpetuity.

# ARTICLE II. ACTIVITIES AND USES EXPRESSLY RESTRICTED OR PROHIBITED AND EXCEPTIONS THERETO

- **A. Prohibited Activities and Uses.** The Protection Area will be maintained in a manner and will not be developed or used in any manner that would impair or interfere with the purposes of this Restoration Declaration. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the following activities and uses are expressly prohibited, except as expressly identified herein as exceptions:
- (1) <u>Industrial, Residential and Commercial Uses</u>. Industrial, residential and commercial activities and the rights of passage for such purposes.
- (2) <u>Agricultural, Grazing and Horticultural Use</u>. Agriculture, grazing, horticultural and animal husbandry operations.
- (3) <u>New Construction</u>. Buildings, facilities, mobile homes, antennas, utility poles, towers, and other structures.
- (4) <u>Dumping or Storing</u>. Dumping or storage of soil, trash, ashes, garbage, waste, abandoned vehicles, appliances or machinery, or other material.
- (5) <u>Mitigation</u>. Neither the Protection Area nor any portion thereof may be used to satisfy compensatory mitigation requirements under 33 USC Section 1344 or NCGS §143-214.11 or any successor or replacement provision of the foregoing.
- (6) <u>Open Space Requirements</u>. The Protection Area may not be used to satisfy open space requirements of any cluster or other development scheme.
- (7) <u>Development Rights</u>. All development rights are extinguished from the Protection Area and may not be transferred to any other lands pursuant to a transfer of development rights scheme or cluster development arrangement or otherwise.
- **B.** Activities and Uses Restricted in the Easement Area. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the following activities and uses are expressly restricted, except as expressly identified herein as exceptions:
- (1) <u>Cutting of Vegetation</u>. Except as related to removal of non-native plants, diseased or damaged trees, and vegetation that obstructs, destabilizes or renders unsafe the Protection Area to persons or natural habitat or as necessitated by the activities described in Article III, above, all cutting, removal, mowing, harming, or destruction of any trees and vegetation on the Protection Area is prohibited.
- (2) <u>Stream Crossings and Roads</u>. New stream crossings for livestock and access to adjacent property are prohibited, with the understanding that any crossing may not impede flow of water or aquatic life. Existing roads, trails, or paths may be maintained with loose gravel or permanent vegetation to stabilize or cover the surfaces.

- (3) <u>Signs</u>. Signs are prohibited, except interpretive signs describing activities and the purpose and function of the Protection Area, signs identifying the owner of the Property, signs giving directions, and signs prescribing rules and regulations for the use of the Protection Area.
- (4) <u>Grading, Mineral Use, Excavation, Dredging</u>. Grading, filling, excavation, dredging, mining, drilling, and removal of topsoil, sand, gravel, rock, peat, minerals, and other materials are prohibited, except as necessitated by activities described in Article III.
- (5) <u>Water Quality and Drainage Patterns</u>. Except as necessitated by activities described in Article III, diking, draining, dredging, channeling, filling, leveling, pumping, impounding or diverting, causing, allowing or permitting the diversion of surface or underground water; altering or tampering with water control structures or devices; disruption or alteration of the restored, enhanced, or created drainage patterns; and removal of wetlands, polluting or discharging into waters, springs, seeps, or wetlands, or use of pesticide or biocides are prohibited.
- (6) <u>Subdivision and Conveyance</u>. The Protection Area may not be subdivided, partitioned nor conveyed, except in its current configuration as an entity or block of property.

#### ARTICLE III. ACTIVITIES AND USES EXPRESSLY ALLOWED

Any activity on or use of the Protection Area not consistent with the purposes of this Restoration Declaration or that could interfere with maintenance of the Protection Area in its natural or restored condition is prohibited. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the following activities and uses are expressly allowed on the Protection Area:

- **A.** Passive Recreational Uses. The Declarant may engage in undeveloped recreational uses, including hiking, bird watching, hunting and fishing, and access to the Protection Area for the purposes thereof. Motorized vehicles may be used on trails, paths, and roads existing on the date hereof and only for managing, maintaining, and stewarding the Protection Area.
- **B.** Educational Uses. The Declarant may engage in and permit others to engage in educational uses on the Protection Area consistent with this Restoration Declaration and the right of access to the Protection Area for such purposes, including organized educational activities such as site visits and observations. Educational uses of the Protection Area may not alter vegetation, hydrology, or topography.
- **C. Restoration.** The Declarant and its representatives may engage in the Restoration Project. All activity associated with the Restoration Project will be conducted according to the requirements hereof and those incorporated herein from the Grant Contract and pursuant to all applicable laws, rules, regulations, and permits.

#### ARTICLE IV. RIGHT OF ENFORCEMENT IN STATE

In the event that the Declarant fails to comply with the terms of this Restoration Declaration, pursuant to the terms of the Grant Contract between the Declarant and the State acting by and through the Fund, the State has the independent right to enforce the terms of this Restoration

Declaration through any and all authorities available under State law. Any forbearance by the State to exercise this right of enforcement may not be deemed or construed to be a waiver by the State of such right in general or with respect to a specific violation of any of the terms of this Restoration Declaration. The State and its agents and employees have such right of entry and access to the Protection Area as may be necessary to carry out the rights of enforcement set forth herein.

#### ARTICLE V. DECLARANT'S WARRANTY OF TITLE

The Declarant covenants, represents, and warrants that (i) the Declarant is the sole owner and is seized of the Protection Area in fee simple and has good right to grant and convey the aforesaid Restoration Declaration; (ii) there is legal access to the Property and the Protection Area; (iii) the Protection Area is free and clear of any and all encumbrances, except those exceptions of record, none of which would nullify, impair or limit in any way the terms or effect of this Restoration Declaration; and (iv) the Declarant will defend its title against the claims of all persons whomsoever.

#### ARTICLE VI. MISCELLANEOUS

- **A. Stewardship of the Protection Area.** Pursuant to the terms of the Grant Contract, the Declarant hereby covenants and agrees that it will monitor and observe the Protection Area in perpetuity to assure compliance with the purposes and provisions of this Restoration Declaration and the provisions of the Grant Contract.
- **B.** Subsequent Transfer of Fee. The Declarant may not convey the Property or any interest therein and may not incur, assume, or suffer to exist any lien upon or with respect to the Property without disclosing to the prospective buyer the Restoration Declaration, the obligations of an owner of the Property, and limitations on use of the Property hereunder. The Declarant further agrees to make any subsequent lease, deed, or other legal instrument by which any interest in the Property is conveyed subject to the Restoration Declaration herein created.
- **C.** Transfer of the Restoration Declaration. The Declarant has have the right to transfer this Restoration Declaration to a "qualified conservation organization" under Section 170(h) of the Code, only if the agency or organization expressly agrees to assume the responsibility imposed on the Grantee by this declaration and if said transfer is approved by the State acting by and through the Fund or its successor agency.
- **D.** Amendments. The Declarant or its successors in interest in the Protection Area is free to amend this Restoration Declaration to meet changing conditions, provided that no amendment will be allowed that is inconsistent with the purposes of this Restoration Declaration or affects the perpetual duration of this Restoration Declaration. Such amendment(s) require the written consent of both the Declarant and the Fund and will be effective upon recording in the public records of Watauga County, North Carolina. The Declarant acknowledges that it has no right to agree to any activity that would result in the termination of this Restoration Declaration.

**E.** Interpretation. This Restoration Declaration will be construed and interpreted under the laws of the State, and any ambiguities herein will be resolved so as to give maximum effect to the purposes of this Restoration Declaration as stated herein. Further, this Restoration Declaration will be construed to promote the purposes of the Conservation Agreements Act, which authorizes the creation of conservation agreements for purposes including those set forth herein, such conservation purposes as are defined in Section 170(h) (4) (A) of the Code and set forth in NCGS Chapter 113A, Article 18. If any provision of this Restoration Declaration is found to be invalid, the remainder of the provisions of this Restoration Declaration, and the application of such provision to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is found to be invalid, will not be affected thereby.

The vote of any county in good standing may be cast by any one of its County Commissioners who is present at the time the vote is taken; provided, if no commissioner be present, such vote may be cast by another county official, elected or appointed, who holds elective office or an appointed position in the county whose vote is being cast and who is formally designated by the Board of County Commissioners. These provisions shall likewise govern district meetings of the Association. A county in good standing is defined as one which has paid the current year's dues."
